Life Threatening Allergies Protocol Anaphylaxis Procedure: CALL 911

- 1. Keep an emergency Epi-pens in the school office where it can be reached quickly.
- 2. Parents will notify the school nurse by providing an allergy plan if a student has identified allergies.
- 3. The parent will bring medication to the school to have available in the event of an allergic reaction. A medication permission form or allergy plan must be completed and signed by the parent and the student's physician on an annual basis.
- 4. The school nurse will notify the school staff via a medical alert as appropriate and or allergy plan of any student identified with known allergies.
- 5. The allergy medication for a specific student will be sent with the student if the student leaves the building on a field trip.
- 6. School personnel will be trained annually in the care of the student with allergies.
- 7. The school principal will be notified whenever an Epi-pen is used and every attempt will be made to notify a student's parent.
- 8. The Epi-pen should be used as follows:
 - The Epi-pen contains .3 mg/.3ml Epinephrine for intramuscular use (use for person over 66 pounds).
 - The Epi-pen Jr. contains .15 mg/.3ml Epinephrine for intramuscular use (use for person under 66 pounds).
 - Epi-pens may be used through clothing if necessary.
 - Remove the blue cap.
 - Place the orange tip on the thigh at a right angle to the leg (or follow the directions on the Epipen).
 - Press hard into the thigh until the Auto-injector functions, count to ten and then remove the Epi-pen.
- 9. A copy of this procedure will be located in the emergency field trip bag and in the medication notebook in the school office.
